2. Chairman's Opening Remarks, approval of previous minutes and matters arising

- The Chair thanked Sandra Jackson (Secretariat), Lucinda Shaw (Partnerships Manager), Gary Randall (European Research Manager), Victoria Brewer (SSOFT Project Manager) and Jelena Misita (Advocacy Manager) for their excellent work on behalf of SAFE during 2018.
- The 2017 GA minutes were circulated to the SAFE membership prior to the GA. No queries arose from the minutes and they were approved for signature by the President and the Secretary.

3. Membership Applications, Resignations and Terminations

- > There were two applications for ordinary membership:
 - CEREBRUM (Czech Republic)
 - Porazka (Slovakia)

The statutes of both organisations were available to view on the SAFE website prior to the GA

The applications from CEREBRUM and Porazka were approved and the organisations were welcomed to SAFE.

- No contact has been received from Heart For Arrhythmia Association (Stowarzyszenie "Serce dla arytmii") Poland for two years, and no membership fee has been paid. It was therefore decided that they would be expelled as a member of SAFE.
- > Heilafelagið (Faroe Islands) resigned from SAFE

4. Board Member elections and resignations

- The SAFE President advised the meeting that all members could get back some or all of their membership fee by disseminating the research findings sent annually
- > SAFE will also continue to support all members with free communications around European Stroke Awareness Day and World Stroke Day. We are also supporting the membership with the SSOFT training materials.

6. SAFE Annual Report and other board decisions

- The SAFE Annual Report was presented to the General Assembly, along with the SAFE Strategy 2017 to 2021, the 2017 Accounts and 2019 budget.
- The membership thanked the board for the comprehensive report produced for 2018
- The accounts for 2018 were passed
- > The budget for 2019 was approved. The membership accepted the explanation from the SAFE President that many activities planned for 2019 were dependent on funding.
- > After discussions at the 2017 GA, the board discussed further the issue of insurance to limit the liability of board members. This insurance was taken out during 2018.
- The membership was advised that, as with all organisations, commercial organisations go through difficult trading situations, and this can mean that sponsorship of SAFE from them may reduce or ce3ase. We therefore have to expand our capacity for receiving funds from elsewhere. During 2019 the SAFE board will continue to explore further funding opportunities.

7. Regional Conferences 2018

- ➤ The GA was advised that we would again receive sponsorship from Boehringer Ingellheim to hold conferences during 2018.
- ➤ The SAFE board will discuss options for venues at the board meeting in January and advise the membership.

8. GA Ratification of Board Decisions and Proposals

The GA had no questions on any board decisions made by the board during 2018, and all decisions were ratified.

9. Date and venue of 2019 Working Conference and General Assembly

➤ This was confirmed as being Porto, Portugal on 27th, 28th & 29th November 2019.

10. Other business

- The SAFE President advised the Assembly that Miquel Gallofre (Catalonia) had been our representative at ESO for the past three years. Miquel is now stepping down from this role and Markus Wagner will be taking over from him. The President thanked M Gallofre for his work on behalf of SAFE
- > SAFE are planning a meeting in the European Parliament, at the request of the office of the Romanian Presidency, in May 2019. Further details will be sent to the membership as they become available.
- Grant giving to smaller organisations: At the 2017 GA, the membership approved the SAFE board giving grants to smaller member organisations who have shown to have done exceptional work on behalf of stroke survivors during 2018. Awards were made this year to:

Articles of Association

of

SAFE

(THE STROKE ALLIANCE FOR EUROPE)

(Non-official translation)



FOUNDED IN 2004 as AISBL, converted to ASBL in 2016 (Lastly amended on 31 October 2019)

TITLE I: NAME AND REGISTERED OFFICE

Art. 1: An international non-profit making association called "Stroke Alliance for Europe" ("I'Alliance Europeene contre l'Attaque Cérébrale") is created. The association has the right to use the abbreviation "SAFE" in all acts, announcements, publications and other documents used by, or on the authority of the association.

The association is governed by the dispositions of the Belgian Code for Companies and Associations (hereafter called "the BCCA").

Art. 2. The office of the association is established in the Brussels Capital Region. It may be transferred by a simple decision of the Board to any other place in the Brussels Capital Region or the Walloon region.

In case the office would need to be transferred to the Flemish Region, following which the official language of the articles of association will have to be changed from French into Dutch, the General Assembly shall take this decision and amend the language of the articles of association accordingly.

Each decision to transfer the office must be filed with the clerk's office of the relevant enterprise court and published in the Annexes to the Belgian State Gazette.

The activities of the association may take place all over the world.

TITLE II: OBJECTIVES AND DURATION

Art. 3: The objectives of the association, a non-profit making organisation, are:

- to promote awareness and understanding of stroke;
- to promote prevention of strokes;
- to identify those at risk of stroke;
- to improve access to appropriate treatment and care for persons affected by stroke;
- to improve the quality of life of people affected by stroke and their families and carers;
- to promote better access to accurate and understandable information about stroke;
- to increase the priority given to stroke by policy and decision-makers and by health care providers;
- to promote research on stroke and related areas:
- to co-ordinate the efforts of national stroke patient groups in Europe;
- to support the growth of stroke organisations reflecting the views of stroke survivors and their supporters.

The association may realise its objectives of international usefulness in any way that seems most appropriate. It may engage in any similar activity with parallel objectives.

- **Art. 4** In order to realise its objectives, the association may:
 - acquire, receive and manage all personal or real estates;
 - apply for subsidies;
 - receive donations and legacies;
 - give grants, periodically or not; and
 - dispose of all contributions, grants and other incomes of funds, periodically or not.
- Art. 5 The duration of the association is unlimited. It can at any time be terminated by a decision of the General Assembly.

TITLE III: MEMBERS

- § 1: Categories of members and conditions of admission.
- Art. 6 The number of members is unlimited, but shall not be less than three. The association is composed of ordinary members, associate members and honorary members.

The following are eligible for ordinary membership and can vote at General Assemblies on any issues:

- the founding members; and
- all other European (as defined by the World Health Organisation)
 national organisations constituted according to the laws and customs of
 their country of origin, which support those at risk of and affected by
 stroke.

The Board shall propose any such organisations for election as ordinary members. The Board will decide at a Board meeting by a simple majority vote upon the election of new ordinary members.

Associate membership may be offered by the Board, by a simple majority vote at a Board meeting, to organisations, constituted according to the laws and customs of their country of origin, which support those at risk of and affected by stroke, and who do not fulfil the criteria for ordinary membership.

Honorary members are individuals or organisations, constituted according to the law and customs of their country of origin, which have provided outstanding support to the association in furtherance of its objectives. The Board shall propose any such individuals or organisations for election as honorary members at a Board meeting, which will decide by a simple majority vote. Each time reference is made to "members" in these articles of association, reference is made to ordinary, associate and honorary members.

- § 2: Resignation or expulsion of members.
- **Art. 7** Any member is free to resign from the association by submitting its resignation to the Board in writing. Such resignation would be effective with immediate effect with no reimbursement.
- Art. 8 The expulsion of any member of the association can be proposed by the Board, after having heard any defence of the member concerned. The final decision to expel the member is taken at the next General Assembly, if at least two-thirds of the ordinary members are present or represented at the meeting, with a two-thirds majority.

In case the required attendance quorum of two-thirds of ordinary members present or represented by proxy is not attained at the first organised General Assembly, a second General Assembly with the same agenda will have to be convened. The second General Assembly will be held not earlier than 15 days following the first General Assembly.

The second General Assembly shall decide definitively and validly upon the proposals deferred from the previous meeting, by a two-thirds majority vote, regardless of the number of ordinary members present or represented.

A member can be excluded, e.g., if:

- it fails to pay its annual contribution;
- it no longer fulfils the stated requirements for membership;
- it brings the association into disrepute;
- it commits serious infringements of the articles of association.

The Board may suspend, until the final decision of the General Assembly, any member which is deemed to have contravened any of these requirements.

- **Art. 9** The ordinary members have no obligation for the financial or other activities of the association and are solely responsible for the execution of their mandate.
- § 3: Membership annual contribution.
- **Art. 10** The members may be liable to pay an annual contribution, the amount of which shall be proposed each year by the Board to the General Assembly for approval.

The annual contribution shall be maximum one (1) million euros.

TITLE IV: GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Art. 11 The General Assembly possesses all powers to fulfil the objectives of the association. Ordinary, associate and honorary members may take part in discussions at the General Assembly, but only ordinary members may vote on any issue.

The following powers shall be exercised only by the General Assembly:

- amendment of the articles of association;
- approval of the annual accounts and the budget;
- voluntary dissolution of the association;
- expulsion of ordinary members;
- appointment, dismissal and discharge of Board members and Officers of SAFE;
- bringing an association claim against Board members and/or Officers;
- all other cases where required by Belgian law.

All other matters shall be the responsibility of the Board.

Art. 12 The General Assembly shall meet at least once a year. Each General Assembly shall take place on the day, place and hour as indicated in the convocation notice. All members shall receive the convocation notice by ordinary letter or email.

The association shall meet in Extraordinary General Assembly by decision of the Board or at the request of one fifth of the ordinary members of the association. In case of the latter, the Board will convene the Extraordinary General Assembly within 21 days of the request to convene and the Extraordinary General Assembly is held no later than 40 days after this request.

Art. 13 The Board shall notify each member in a convocation notice, 60 days before the General Assembly. The convocation notice shall be signed by the President or a nominated Board member.

The convocation notice shall include the agenda and all supporting documents. Any matter, other than those listed on the agenda, may be discussed and voted upon if it is received from an ordinary member by the Board in writing no less than six weeks before the meeting.

Art. 14 The General Assembly shall be quorate only if at least half of the ordinary members are present or represented at the meeting. The decisions of the General Assembly shall be made by simple majority vote, unless the articles of association or Belgian law specifically stipulate otherwise.

However, if less than half of the ordinary members are present, or represented by proxy, a second General Assembly with the same agenda will have to be convened. The second General Assembly will be held not earlier than 15 days following the first General Assembly.

This second General Assembly meeting shall decide definitively and validly upon the proposals deferred from the previous meeting, by a simple majority vote, regardless of the number of ordinary members present or represented.

Art. 15 The ordinary members have an equal right to vote, with each ordinary member being entitled to one vote. Each member-organisation shall nominate one of its members to be the voting delegate at the General Assembly. Such member-organisation shall submit the identification details of its voting delegate no later than 10 business days prior to the date of the General Assembly concerned.

Any ordinary member, if necessary, may be represented by a proxy, who shall be the delegate of one of the other ordinary members of the association. Any ordinary member present at the meeting cannot cast a proxy vote on behalf of more than one absent ordinary member. The Chairman of the meeting shall have a casting vote, in the event of an equal vote on any resolution.

- Art. 16 The decisions of the General Assembly shall be recorded in minutes and signed by the Chairman of the meeting and one Board member. Those minutes shall be circulated to all members and shall also be available for examination at the registered office of the association and with the Secretariat. The minutes of the General Assembly are approved at the following meeting, and a copy of the minutes shall be circulated to all members of the association.
- Art. 17 The accounts of the financial year and the budget for the following period shall be closed each year on 31 December. .
- **Art. 18** In case of voluntary dissolution, the General Assembly shall designate one or two liquidators and determine their powers.

TITLE V: MODIFICATION OF THE ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION AND DISSOLUTION

Art. 19 Without prejudice to the provisions of the BCCA, any proposal for amendment of the articles of association or for the dissolution of the association, must be made by the Board or any ordinary member of the association.

Any such proposal must be submitted to the Secretary at least six weeks prior to the Extraordinary General Assembly at which the proposal shall be voted upon. The Secretary shall send the proposal to the ordinary members at least

four weeks prior to the Extraordinary General Assembly at which the proposal shall be voted upon.

The Extraordinary General Assembly may decide validly on any proposal of amendment of the articles of association or dissolution of the association only if two-thirds of the ordinary members are present or represented by proxy, whereby a voting majority of two-thirds is required for amendment of the articles of association and a voting majority of four-fifth for dissolution of the association.

However, if less than two-thirds of the ordinary members are present, or represented by proxy, another Extraordinary General Assembly shall be convened with the same agenda. The second Extraordinary General Assembly will be held not earlier than 15 days following the first Extraordinary General Assembly.

The second Extraordinary General Assembly shall decide definitively and validly upon the proposals deferred from the previous meeting, by a two-thirds majority vote, regardless of the number of ordinary members present or represented by proxy. However, if the amendment of the articles of association relates to the object or the disinterested purpose of the association, a four-fifth majority vote is required.

In all cases of dissolution, at whatever time or for whatever reason, any residual funds, after payment of any debts and charges, shall be transferred to an organisation or multiple organisations, to the extent allowed by the BCCA, supporting people affected by stroke. In default of such a decision, the funds must be allocated to a disinterested purpose with similar objectives.

TITLE VI: MANAGEMENT

Art. 20 The association is managed by a Board that is composed of at least 5 and no more than 11 members, elected by the General Assembly by a simple majority vote and chosen from among the delegates of ordinary members. Any country may be represented by no more than one Board member at any time. The association will seek representation on the Board from stroke survivors and care givers.

Only ordinary members can propose candidates for the Board and become members of the Board.

Twelve weeks prior to the General Assembly, the Secretary shall circulate a request to all ordinary members for nominations to the Board. Any ordinary member wishing to nominate a delegate for election as a Board member, shall submit such nomination in writing to the Secretary at least eight weeks prior to the General Assembly. In support of such nomination, a brief biography of the delegate shall be provided. Two weeks prior to the General Assembly, the

Secretary shall circulate, to all ordinary members, copies of all valid nominations received, together with the accompanying biographies. In case no nomination is received in advance of the General Assembly, the Board will have discretion to propose candidates on the day of the General Assembly.

The Board members shall be elected for a term of three years and are eligible for re-election once. No person shall be eligible for more than six consecutive years. After six continuous years of service on the Board, the Board member may not again be nominated for re-election until at least one calendar year has elapsed.

The General Assembly shall elect a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, called the Officers of SAFE, amongst the elected Board members by a simple majority vote.

Twelve weeks prior to the General Assembly, the Secretary shall circulate a request to all ordinary members for nominations of the Officers. Any ordinary member wishing to nominate a delegate for election as an Officer, shall submit such nomination in writing to the Secretary at least eight weeks prior to the General Assembly. In support of such nomination, a brief biography of the delegate shall be provided. Two weeks prior to the General Assembly, the Secretary shall circulate, to all ordinary members, copies of all valid nominations received, together with the accompanying biographies. In case no nomination is received in advance of the General Assembly, the Board will have discretion to propose candidates on the day of the General Assembly.

Only individuals that have been elected as Board member can be elected as Officer.

The Officers shall be elected for a term of three years and are eligible for reelection once. No person shall be eligible for more than six consecutive years. After six continuous years of service as an Officer, the concerned Officer may not again be nominated for re-election until at least one calendar year has elapsed.

If the President is absent, his/her functions shall be assumed by the Vice President or, by default, by the Secretary.

All acts concerning the election, the revocation and the cessation of the functions of Board members or of the persons entitled to represent the association, are submitted for publication in the Annexes to the Belgian State Gazette within 30 days.

Any Board member may be removed from office by a two-thirds majority vote of ordinary members at a General Assembly.

Those Board members who retire, shall remain in office until their successor(s) are put in place.

Art. 21 The Board members shall receive no payment for undertaking their responsibilities, but they may receive a reimbursement of their actual and documented travel and other expenses for attending Board meetings and any other meetings on behalf of the association.

In the event of a Board member resigning his/her post during a term of office, the remaining Board members have the right to co-opt a new Board member and as such nominate a replacement for the remaining term of office. The mandate of the co-opted Board member would need to be confirmed at the next General Assembly and the co-opted Board member would need to be made ordinary member. Upon confirmation, the co-opted Board member shall fulfil the mandate of his/her predecessor. In the absence of such confirmation, the term of office of the co-opted Board member shall be terminated at the end of the General Assembly, without prejudice to the regularity of the composition of the Board until that General Assembly.

Art. 22 The Board shall meet as required, but at least twice a year. The Board meetings shall be convened by the President or at the request of at least two other Board members. The convocation notice is made by ordinary letter or email.

The Board meetings shall require a quorum of at least half of the elected present or represented Board members.

Each Board member may give, in writing or by email, delegated authority to one of his/her Board colleagues to replace him/her and vote on his/her behalf at the Board meetings. The Board member who has been delegated must be present at the meeting. No Board member may represent more than one of his/her colleagues at any Board meeting.

Decisions of the Board are taken by simple majority vote of the members either present or who have been given delegated authority. In the case of an equal vote, the Chairman of the meeting shall have a casting vote.

The decisions of all Board meetings shall be recorded in minutes, signed by the Chairman of the meeting and one other Board member present. The minutes shall be circulated to all Board members. The minutes shall be recorded in a register kept at the registered office of the association and with the Secretariat.

The Board can also take decisions by unanimous written resolutions. This procedure cannot be followed for the following decisions:

- elect new ordinary, associate and honorary members;
- expel associate and honorary members; and

 prepare the budget for the following financial year and the annual accounts for the preceding financial year and submit these to the General Assembly for approval.

In case a conflict of interest arises during a Board meeting for a Board member, the conflict of interests procedure as described in the BCCA will apply.

The decisions and actions of the Board shall be communicated regularly to the ordinary members.

Art. 23 The Board has all powers to raise funds, administer and manage the association, within the terms of the articles of association and Belgian law, in order to fulfil the objectives of the association.

The Board is competent to deal with any issues on behalf of the association, in the broadest sense. Anything that is not specifically the responsibility of the General Assembly following the dispositions of Belgian law or the articles of association, shall be considered to be within the remit of the Board.

In particular, the Board has power to:

- elect new ordinary, associate and honorary members;
- expel associate and honorary members:
- prepare the budget for the following financial year and the annual accounts for the preceding financial year and submit these to the General Assembly for approval;
- make or receive payments or deposits;
- acquire, exchange, lease or deal freely with property, whether donated or not, over any term of years;
- accept or receive all real or personal estates;
- accept or receive all official and private subsidies and subventions;
- accept or receive all legacies and donations;
- consent to and conclude all contracts, in any markets or with any companies or individuals;
- contract all loans, with or without guarantee;
- consent to and accept all cautions-money and subrogation;
- mortgage any property of the association;
- contract and administer all loans and advances;
- take legal action, plead before all jurisdictions and execute all judgements;
- file settlements or agreements:
- enter into settlements;
- delegate certain of its powers to special committees or mandataries by way of proxies; and
- make investments after taking into consideration proper professional investment advice.

The Board shall, by itself or by delegation, appoint or dismiss advisors or employees and personnel of the association and determinate their remuneration or fees.

- **Art. 24** The Board shall carry out, or cause to be carried out, all activities of the association and shall ensure that the decisions of the General Assembly are fulfilled.
- Art. 25 Any documents that commit the association shall be signed by the President and one other Board member or by proxy appointed by the Board, neither of whom requires justifying his/her power to do so.

Any legal actions, whether as plaintiff or defendant, shall be pursued by the Board represented by its President or by another Board member appointed by the President.

- Art. 26 The Board shall appoint one person who shall be responsible for administering the day-to-day work of the association. The appointed person shall provide regular reports to the Board on the affairs of the association and shall present proposals of useful activities for all acts of daily management. The appointed person shall have the power to sign all documents related to the daily management of the association and, in particular, shall have power to sign any bank cheques or other documents for payments within rules set and monitored by the Board.
- Art. 27 In case the President has given notice that he/she will be resigning and in order to facilitate the transition between the offices, the Board shall appoint a President Elect who will be succeeding the President from among the delegates of ordinary members.

The President Elect will receive training from the Board for a duration of one year before the resignation date of the President. The goal of this one-year training is to make the President Elect fully acquainted with the structure and functioning of the association and to prepare him/her for the function of President.

The President Elect will:

- learn about the association's objectives, policies, and programmes;
- assist and support the President and the Board as needed;
- attend and participate in all Board meetings and review and comment on Board meetings minutes;
- prepare and present information at Board meetings as needed;
- offer support in financial oversight of the association's accounts; and
- perform other duties as assigned by the President.

The President Elect shall automatically become President at the end of the term as President Elect.

- **Art. 28** The Board shall establish all it considers as necessary (internal regulations, etc.). Those documents complement the articles of association and cannot contravene the articles of association.
- **Art. 29** All documents shall be written in English, without prejudice to contrary legal dispositions.

The documents produced by the corporate bodies of the association will be translated into French to the extent required by the BCCA, in particular (but not limited to) all documents which need to be published in the Annexes to the Belgian State Gazette.

The French version of the articles of association is the official version.

TITLE VII: BUDGET AND ACCOUNTS

Art. 30 The financial year of the association shall begin on 1 January and end on 31 December.

The annual accounts for the closed financial year and the budget of the next financial year shall be prepared each year by the Board and submitted to the General Assembly for approval at its following meeting.

The annual accounts shall be submitted with the clerk's office of the relevant enterprise court within 30 days following the General Assembly approving the annual accounts and within 7 months after closure of the financial year of the association.

TITLE VIII: GENERAL DISPOSITIONS

Art. 31 The dispositions of the BCCA will provide for any matters not covered by the present articles of association.

Stroke Alliance for Europe

Every 20 seconds someone in Europe has a stroke. A stroke does not discriminate. It can happen to anyone at any time in their life. Strokes are sudden and their consequences can be devastating.

The Stroke Alliance for Europe is the leading European patient organisation solely concerned with helping everyone affected by stroke in Europe.

Our mission

We work towards all patients in Europe with stroke having rights of access to a continuum of care. From prevention and risk identification, through emergency response to organised stroke units in acute phase, to appropriate rehabilitation and secondary prevention measures.

Our vision

SAFE's vision is to work towards greatly decreasing the number of strokes in Europe and that all who are touched by stroke get the help and support they need.

SAFE therefore engages in activities such as campaigning, education and encouraging research, which contribute to the advancement of stroke prevention and the improvement of the quality of life of stroke survivors, their families and carers.

President's message

This has been a busy and exciting year for our organisation, especially in terms of advocating on pan-European level. We have continued work around the Stroke Action Plan for Europe, forming an implementation committee with the European Stroke Organisation. We held a seminal event at the EU parliament raising the profile of stroke more than ever before, engaging with the Deputy Director General of the EU's DG Sante and the EU Committee of the Regions. Through our funding of Oxford University's project on the economic impact of stroke, we have produced up to date and compelling evidence about the cost of stroke in Europe. With all this accomplished, we continue to press ahead, as we have now completed the third and final year of the research which will provide us with vital European and country specific data on the future economic impact of stroke and power of interventions. The Economic Impact of Stroke in Europe report will be launched in full at the Joint World Stroke Organisation/European Stroke Organisation conference in Vienna in May 2020.

We have continued with the Angels project to produce vital information booklets on stroke to distribute to patients and families while in hospital. We have provided this information in 15 different languages to ensure that more people across Europe can use our materials to improve the lives of stroke survivors.

We continue our educational work with those who wish to understand stroke support organisations and become advocates for better care through our online teaching and learning tool SSOFT, and our regional and working conferences.

A particular highlight for me in 2019 was the concrete evidence of the value of our partnership orientation, our Industry partners have been very supportive again, our outreach to ESO has been reciprocated, and we continue to see the number of SSO's grow, and then become members of SAFE. Yet again we go into a new year with record membership which bodes well for the future.

As SAFE goes from strength to strength in activities to reduce the number and effects of strokes, the Board must also ensure the long-term sustainability of SAFE. The Board has achieved much of its work through dedicated voluntary time but has recognised that this needs to be added to by full time paid staff. The Board agreed that SAFE required more permanent leadership to drive forward and to achieve our goals. I am delighted to let you know that we recruited our first Director General this year and I know you will all join me in welcoming Arlene Wilkie into the SAFE family.

In 2019, we have been able to deliver many significant achievements because of our close working community. I would like to thank those that have worked with and for SAFE this year, and to the members and sponsors who have supported us practically and financially. This next year is my last as President and I am looking forward to ensuring we have a solid 2020 of achievement to strengthen the long term sustainability of all stroke support organisations in Europe.

SAFE 2019

Our 2017-2021 strategy sets out seven priorities that we work towards to achieve our mission and vision:

- Prevention of strokes
- Support stroke patients to receive better access to specialist care and rehabilitation
- Influencing and campaigning
- Grow and support stroke support organisations
- Research
- Governance and resources

Prevention of strokes

Stroke has now climbed to become the second biggest cause of death in the world, and the number one cause of severe long-term disability. SAFE does not have the resources to combat the disparate cause of ill health across Europe, but we can play a part in more focussed campaigns to ensure that where warning signs appear, or can easily be diagnosed, then action takes place to prevent a stroke.

SAFE's website on stroke prevention: available in five more languages in 2018. SAFE created the website www.strokeprevention.info

In 2018 SAFE created the website www.strokeprevention.info, providing key information about 10 modifiable stroke risk factors in a lay-friendly format. We were motivated to do this because, despite compelling evidence that it is a largely preventable condition, around 17 million strokes occur worldwide each year. Stroke shares risk factors with other cardiovascular diseases and with many other non-infectious, or non-communicable diseases.

The aim of this website is to inform and inspire people to take individual steps, such as giving up smoking or taking better control over their blood pressure, and to take an active role in preventing stroke.

In 2019:

To increase greater accessibility of its content for millions of people who speak these languages, the website was translated to Polish, Spanish, Portuguese, Russian and French and relaunched in autumn 2019.

Support stroke patients to receive better access to specialist care and rehabilitation

Stroke treatment and care is not a priority in many countries. Provision is unequal across Europe and within member countries. SAFE will put the experiences of people who have had a stroke and their families at the centre of all our discussions, campaigning and lobbying, acting as an advocate at a European and supporting local level member campaigns.

Angels Initiative and SAFE: improving patient – doctor communication
The Angels Initiative is a unique healthcare initiative launched by Boehringer
Ingelheim in partnership with the European Stroke Organisation (ESO), the World
Stroke Organisation (WSO) and SAFE.

The Angels Initiative project aims to improve stroke outcomes, save lives and reduce long-term disability. It achieves this by providing information brochures in stroke units to patients and their carers to help them understand more about their condition, and how to actively be involved in their treatment decisions. The SAFE Angels brochures are contributing by positively influencing communication between healthcare professionals and patients. SAFE raises the profile of the Angels Initiative through our stroke support organisations, direct contacts with patients and carers and social media channels.

In 2019, we have:

- 1. Provided the SAFE Angels brochures to more European countries
 In 2018 the Angels information was made available in twelve European
 countries and thirteen languages: Spain, Serbia, Poland, Czech Republic,
 Latvia, Croatia, North Macedonia, Greece, Ukraine, Georgia, Hungary and
 Turkey. In 2019, this was expanded to Slovakia, Cyprus and France.
- 2. Updated the SAFE Angels brochures based on feedback from patients and medics.

SAFE made changes in the format, producing a collection of all five brochures in one specially designed book. The overarching title is 'Surviving Stroke'. The core texts for all brochures were provided by the Stroke Association UK.

"We didn't have similar patient materials in the past. Now that we do, patients often take all five different brochures and even try to take more copies, for relatives and neighbours."

Influencing and campaigning

Stroke is a preventable, treatable and beatable condition, and as a European alliance support organisation, we are in a strong position to campaign and lobby effectively at EU level for more resources and awareness of stroke, and to support members to operate at country level.

Translation of the Stroke Action Plan for Europe: reaching wider audiences
The Stroke Action Plan for Europe 2018-2030 (the Plan) is a result of collaborative
work between SAFE and ESO, building on the Helsingborg Declarations of 1995 and
2006, and includes two new domains: primary prevention and life after stroke. The

final report was published in 2018 after 18 months work involving over 70 experts in stroke prevention, treatment, rehabilitation and aftercare, as well as stroke advocacy.

In 2019 SAFE:

- 1. Translated the Plan to increase accessibilty to more European countries

 To ensure that the Plan is used by as many countries as possible, SAFE
 translated it to French, Portuguese, Russian, Polish, Spanish, Ukrainian,
 Finnish, Turkish and Greek.
- 2. Promoted the Plan to encourage its implementation
 The first of these activities was at the ESO conference in Milan, when we had
 the printed versions available at our stand. The Plan was also promoted at
 SAFE's regional cenferences. The pdf version of the Plan was promoted
 through SAFE's website and social media in each of the eight languages,
 together with the English version.

The Economic Impact of Stroke in Europe Report: How much does stroke really cost in Europe?

Following the successful cooperation with King's College London and the launch of the *Burden of Stroke in Europe* report in 2017, SAFE commissioned its next key piece of research: the economic impact of stroke in Europe.

The goal of this study, carried out by a health economics team from the University of Oxford in England, is to increase the priority given to stroke, and reinforce and underpin the influencing of European and country-level policy work already underway as a result of the *Burden of Stroke in Europe* report.

Recent modest improvements in acute care mean that more people are surviving stroke, but with impairment. The consequence being that we have a major health economic and social burden catastrophe waiting to happen. This will severely impact all European countries, but especially those where inequalities in stroke healthcare are already known.

In 2019 SAFE will:

Publish a lay reader-friendly and easily digestible report of the reseach results. The report will be divided into three parts: the current cost assessment; future costs projections in case of business as usual; and the impact of interventions on future costs, both on pan-European and country by country level. This will be used by SAFE and partner organisations to build a case for investment in different areas of the stroke care pathway.

The first part of the research, the current costs, will provide a breakdown of the analysis for each country into direct healthcare, direct non-medical and indirect costs (this covers the costs in social care services, and the wider societal and family and

carer, such as days of income lost due to disability, payments in day care, welfare and nursing home costs). SAFE will present this data to its members at the 2019 working conference and promote the findings through SAFE social media channels, as well as through SAFE member organisations' networks.

SAFE will present the latter two parts of the research at the joint WSO/ESO conference in May 2020 in Vienna, creating a synergy of multi-organisation joint efforts and maximizing the impact of the report's key findings. The launch will raise the profile of the issue that stroke costs and the implications of not doing anything. It will bring the issue to the forefront across a wider audience, including government and policy makers.

Joint event with Romanian Presidency of the Council of the European Union
The event 'Joining forces to prevent and control non-communicable diseases: The role of policy in tackling stroke' took place in Brussels, at the Committee of the Regions. The event, held under the patronage the Romanian Presidency of the Council of the EU, was organised by SAFE in collaboration with ESO and the Romanian National Association of Stroke.

The event brought together European, national and local policy stakeholders to foster discussions on the need for policy action in the area of stroke. In particular, as identified by SAFE's *Burden of Stroke in Europe* report, the disparities between and within European countries across the stroke care pathway, from primary prevention to life after stroke, was addressed as a priority. The event also looked into the role policy and policy stakeholders play in achieving the targets of the *Stroke Action Plan for Europe 2018-2030*. We hope that the discussions will feed into the Romanian and upcoming Finnish and Croatian presidencies' health priorities, as well as current and future EU action for preventing and controlling non-communicable diseases.

SAFE and ESO are following-up with key speakers and participants to move forward the identified opportunities. Joining forces with EU policy-makers to address the burden of stroke that stroke survivors, their families and the overall society are currently facing is essential.

Grow and support stroke support organisations

We want to increase the number of organisations and the groups of stroke survivors and carers associated with them across Europe, and help our members to share good practice, experiences and learning and enable sustainability and growth.

Stroke Support Organisation Faculty Tool: online training for our members SAFE, in partnership with the European Stroke Organisation (ESO), identified a need to support members to become strong and positive advocates, so that they can campaign for improved prevention strategies, diagnosis and treatment for stroke, as well as aftercare of survivors and their families. To this end, an online eLearning tool,

the Stroke Support Organisation Faculty Tool (SSOFT), was co-created with SAFE members to educate people on the principles of stroke advocacy.

In 2019:

This project was successfully launched in 2018 and consists of six modules: what is a stroke support organisation, what is advocacy and how is it done, the use of evidence, the role of the patient voice, health systems advocacy and public advocacy

Its implementation started in 2019, by promotion through SAFE's social media channels, and SAFE organised meetings with member organisations. To date, around 350 people from across Europe have used this training course to learn more about stroke advocacy.

"The SSOFT learning tool gave me all the knowledge and information about stroke and other speech and language disorders. I realy like helping those in need. When you offer help without propriety, without expecting a reward, it gives you a feeling of satisfaction and completeness. SSOFT helped me understand and obtain all the necessary information I needed"

SAFE regional and working conferences: bringing our members together SAFE has organised a working conference each year since forming in 2004 – as well as regional conferences for the last five years. Delegates come together to share best practice, skills and experience, and the conferences have played a key part in nurturing and encouraging the growth of stroke patient organisations across Europe. The conferences also provide an opportunity for SAFE to update its members on progress against strategy, with updates on specific key projects, and policy and influencing work. We use the conferences to guide members on how to use resources produced for their advocacy work, to best effect change and raise awareness of all the issues in their own countries.

"As always the conference provided delegates with nothing but the best. Actual topics, interesting workshops, igniting many ideas for next year, getting useful information. It was all excellent."

In 2019:

SAFE brought together 30 European countries from member organisations gathered within their clusters in Paris, Krakow and Stockholm for our regional conferences. At these meetings SAFE updated members on its strategy, its projects including SSOFT, the prevention website and the economic impact of stroke research, its policy work including the *Stroke Action Plan for Europe* and the Romanian Presidency event in the EU.

Research

Research evidence has led to the development of real improvements in stroke prevention, treatment, rehabilitation and care. SAFE has a unique role to play as a stroke support organisation being a visible, pro-active member and advisor to project consortia, disseminating information about research projects through our members.

SAFE's profile amongst the clinical research community in Europe is now higher than it has ever been. This is evidenced by the fact that we had a record number of approaches this year to support research proposals in various ways. These range from simple letters of support, or patient surveys that provide opinion on a research topic, through to full-blown participation by SAFE in a research consortium.

In 2019:

1. We supported 13 research proposals in the following three categories:

Full research and innovation projects

CELLSTROKE - stem cells and acute stroke

EVERBRAIN - extracellular vesicles and brain regeneration post-ischaemic stroke

MICROBIOSsIS – the role of the gut microbiome in post-stroke comorbidity

ACIST - N-Acetylcysteine and intravenous thrombolysis in ischaemic stroke

AURORAS - uric acid and reperfusion in acute stroke

ANGIE - micro-robots to treat thrombolysis

PhD student training networks

ENTRAIN – neuroinflammation and stroke

ADVANCE - image analysis and prediction modelling of stroke outcome

CRANIA - neuroimaging analysis of stroke in the elderly

PRONEST - personalised robots and stroke rehabilitation

European Commission funding for Small and medium-sized enterprises programs

STROKEWATCH – new wearables to detect Atrial Fibrillation

DEEPSTROKE – intelligent image analysis for fast, accurate triage in stroke GONDOLA – novel foot stimulation and walking rehabilitation

2. SAFE was involved as a paid beneficiary of the following five EU Horizon 2020 research projects and contributes to the dissemination of information about each of them:

PRESTIGE-AF - how do atrial fibrillation drugs affect stroke?

TENSION – is thrombectomy effective up to 12 hours post-stroke?

PROOF - high-dose oxygen therapy in acute stroke

PRECIOUS - common complications and acute stroke

SVDs@Target - small vessel disease and its role in stroke

Governance and resources

To deliver this strategy we will generate the resources required to sustain and develop SAFE. We will maintain partnerships that help to deliver our strategy.

At our most recent General Assembly, held after the working conference in Berlin, the following key decisions were made:

- Three board members were elected: Grethe Lunde from Norway (Norsk forening for slagrammede (NFS) as the North Cluster Representative, Chris Macey from Ireland (Irish Heart Foundation) as Treasurer and Marina Charalambous from Cyprus (Cyprus Stroke Organisation) as board member at large.
- Two new organisations were ratified and became full SAFE members: Porážka.sk from Slovakia and CEREBRUM from Czech Republic.
- In addition, SAFE awarded grants to the following SSOs in: Catalonia, Croatia, Cyprus, Iceland, Portugal, Serbia and Turkey for their work in fighting stroke, supporting survivors and their families, and building the patient voice during 2018.

- Launch the Economic Impact of Stroke in Europe report
- Host the Life After Stroke forum
- Actively participate in the implementation of the Stroke Action Plan for Europe
- Lobby within the EU to make stroke a European health priority
- Host three regional conferences

- Promote SSOFT
- Promote SAFE Angels project within the Angels Initiative
- Promote strokeprevention.info
- Represent, communicate and work with our members and supporters
- Fully review our governance, policies and procedures

SAFE governance 2019

SAFE has functioned as a legally registered, nonprofit-making association in Belgium (AISBL) since 2004. The principles which govern SAFE are outlined in our constitution.

General Assembly

The General Assembly is comprised of all the member organisations of SAFE and its principal responsibilities include:

- electing the board and its president
- approving the admission of new member organisations
- approving budgets and annual accounts

SAFE is governed by a board that can comprise no fewer than five and no more than eleven members The board has four key positions: President, Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary. The 2019 SAFE board:

SAFE finances 2018-2019

Message from the Treasurer

In 2018, our income was derived from three funding streams: membership income, the pharmaceutical industry and the European Stroke Organisation. Overall our income was €825,931.61 (€660,599.70 in 2017).

Our membership income grew to €40,770.00 (€25,100.00 in 2017) due to the increase in membership fees and the increase in the number of members.

We received significant support from Amgen, Bayer, BMS-Pfizer Alliance, Boehringer Ingelheim, Ipsen, Merz Angels Initiative and the European Stroke Organisation. We secured €729,116.00 (€601,788.78 in 2017), the highest amount of income SAFE has received in one year. This figure reflects the number of important initiatives for which we sought funding, and, with one exception, we secured the total required for each project.

In addition, we received €55,955.82 (€32,042.54 in 2017) from our partnerships with European research partners.

Our thanks go to all our supporters in 2018 for their continued support and recognition of the importance of the voice of the stroke survivor.

Our expenditure was €872,778.38 (€1,014,610.93 in 2017). This includes the €300,000 accrued from 2017. Overall, there is a deficit of €46,846.77 for the year. This was an agreed deficit and the funds for this were carried over from 2017.

As our financial year-end is 31 December, in this report we are only able to show the projected income and expenditure for 2019. Once again, we show that we have been successful in our fundraising. We continued to work with our generous supporters and have been pleased to receive support for our conferences and projects including the Economic Impact of Stroke in Europe. We will show a deficit for this year, which as in the 2018 budget was agreed and the funds for this were carried over from 2018.

As a stroke survivor, a main care giver to a stroke survivor (my father) and as a Family Physician I have specific insight regarding stroke itself and to the stroke survivors needs. I hope that my personal experience as well as my education can be effectively used to promote the rights of stroke patients and their families in order to achieve biopsychosocial wellbeing for all stroke survivors and their families.
